# 1. Community Hubs

- October Lead-Free NJ Listen and Learn presentation was recorded in English and Spanish.

- b. Trenton: East Trenton Collaborative (Shereyl Snider, <a href="mailto:ssnider@urbanpromisetrenton.org">ssnider@urbanpromisetrenton.org</a>)</a>
  - The EPA is testing soil for lead in the East Trenton neighborhood. The EPA began testing in 2018 at the request of NJDEP.
  - ii. Shereyl is convening organizations and residents in Trenton to coordinate around lead.
  - iii. On January 17 at 6 p.m. there will be an environmental safety organizing committee at East Trenton Collaborative.
- c. Paterson: Paterson Alliance (Shanikwa Lemon, lemonpatersonalliance@gmail.com)
  - Lead Listen and Learn presentations are being conducted throughout the city, including at Eva's Village, Habitat for Humanity, Paterson school district (including full service schools)
  - ii. At presentations, parents said that they did not know if their children were tested for lead, and one parent described turning down the test because their child did not want to be tested.
- d. Southern NJ: PRAC of Southern NJ
- e. Greater Newark: selection is ongoing.

### 2. Coordinating Policy

- a. Lame-duck Priorities
  - <u>\$1507</u>: Revises and codifies schedule for childhood lead screenings; requires lead screenings as precondition of child's initial entry into school system. Contact Ben Haygood, <u>bhaygood@isles.org</u>
    - 1. Progress is currently on hold due to issues with amendments regarding precondition of entry into the school system. Isles is currently working on resolving this and will alert the group of updates & advocacy actions.
  - ii. <u>\$2695</u>: Requires disclosure of lead drinking water hazards to tenants of residential units; prohibits landlords from obstructing replacement of lead service lines; concerns testing of residential units for lead drinking water hazards.     - 1. The bill is expected to move this session. If you have a relationship with a legislator on the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee, you can contact them to voice your support for the bill.

- b. Proposing additional Legislation to Track
  - i. <u>AJR239</u>: Designates October as "Lead Poisoning Awareness Month.
  - ii. <u>\$2459</u>: Requires State government entities provide vital documents and translation services in 15 most common non-English languages.
    - Contact: Amy Torres, NJ Alliance for Immigrant Justice, <u>atorres@njimmigrantjustice.org</u>
    - 2. NJ Alliance for Immigrant Justice organized a letter of support sent to Assembly Speaker Coughlin. The bill has not yet been scheduled for this lame-duck session.
  - iii. The group agrees to add AJR239 & S2459 to the policy tracker.
- c. Awareness/Outreach
  - i. Updating the LFNJ Policy Factsheet:

- d. Planning for 2024
  - i. We will identify priorities/direction and conduct a lead policy training for community advocates in early 2024.

# 3. Blood Lead Level Testing/Health

- a. Coordination with federal partners
  - EPA Region 2 Coordinated a meeting with LFNJ & federal partners to discuss barriers to blood lead level testing in NJ on 11/7/23 (<u>Meeting notes</u>). The next meeting will be held on 12/15/23.
  - ii. Lead-Free NJ is meeting with the NJDOH Commissioner on 1/18/24
- b. Statewide initiative on maternal health (Elyse Pivnick, Isles)
  - i. Isles is inviting Lead-Free NJ to be involved with their statewide initiative on black maternal health.
  - ii. Discussion about planning for a Lead-Free NJ Health Committee to bring in more health practitioners to the collaborative and create a dedicated space to discuss blood lead level testing and other health priorities.
    - LFNJ Advocacy Committee members recommend building partnerships with the
      organizations already working on this topic, power building the collaborative by
      inviting more partners to meetings, considering how health is already a part of
      existing committee work, and considering how this relates to advocacy and
      policy around water and housing infrastructure.
  - iii. The Center for Environmental Exposure and Disease (CEED) at Rutgers University is accepting proposals for Pilot Project Grants, up to \$25,000. Supports new environmental health research with the potential to improve human health and establish or strengthen community partnerships. Applications will be due on February 1, 2024. More information here.

### 4. Housing Committee Updates

- a. Requests to the advocacy committee:
  - i. Advocate for collaboration between NJDCA & NJDOH
  - ii. Advocate for NJDCA to include lead practitioners in their decision-making processes

- iii. Lead assistance program application translation
  - 1. Lead agencies were told that DCA is working on a translation, but they are still waiting for it.
  - Advocacy discussion: Suggestion for members to contact elected officials.
     Specific targets may include Rep Bonnie Watson Coleman and NJ Senate Majority leader Teresa Ruiz.
- b. LFNJ will schedule a meeting with NJDCA Assistant Commissioner Janel Winter as soon as possible in the new year.
  - i. LFNJ DCA Agenda\_12/5/23.docx (draft)
  - ii. Community hubs will be consulted to form the agenda, and will be involved with the meeting.
- c. Lead workforce update from LFNJ member and former LFNJ Community Hub in Newark, Newark Water Coalition (Anthony Diaz)
  - i. Last year, LFNJ collaborative helped facilitate a meeting with NJDCA & NWC to discuss lead workforce equity issues. Recently, NWC was invited by NJDCA to participate in efforts to add new lead agencies to their program. There will be paid training for four positions in January, then an invitation to a closed RFP. Isles is involved with the training.
  - ii. NWC is working on a research project that is exploring lead in dust in post 1978 homes.
