

## LFNJ Joint Steering Committee Meeting January 24, 2023 3:00-5:00 pm Agenda

- 1. Welcome Rashan Prailow/Heather Sorge (5 mins)
  - a. Welcome Advocacy Committee Members (open meeting)
    - i. Please introduce yourself in the chat and answer the following fun icebreaker: If you could teleport anywhere in the world right now, where would you go?

- 2. Committee and Community Hub Updates and Discussion of Support Needs Heather Sorge & Suzanne Aptman (35 mins)
  - a. Trenton Community Hub: Shereyl Snider, East Trenton Collaborative (ETC)
    - i. ETC's main focus is on community education of lead hazards and resources for support. They plan to do workshops, outreach, and partnerships with other organizations.
    - ii. On 1/25, ETC will be tabling in Trenton with Tha Block Trenton.
    - iii. Ruth Ann Norton of Green and Health Homes Initiative requested that Trenton families be referred to their whole house pilot program.
  - b. Newark Community Hub: Anthony Diaz, Newark Water Coalition (NWC)
    - i. Anthony shared highlights from the NWC report titled "The Mobile Lead Testing Unit Report." This report shares the results of the research NWC conducted with >300 Newark City homes. The team tested these homes for lead in paint, water, soil, and dust.
      - The report has been translated into Spanish, and is not yet ready to be shared publicly, please do not distribute.
      - They hope this work will raise awareness around the serious nature of lead in our homes and lives and help to expand this research in Newark and other cities.
      - Some highlights include: documenting health concerns, community questions, and finding that all soil samples contained lead.

- The report was completed in partnership with University of California at Berkeley Ph.D. student Bavisha Kalyan. Anthony commended this relationship for supporting community ownership of data and projects, especially because many relationships between researchers and communities have historically been exploitative to communities.
- ii. NWC is seeking grants to fund lead testing of dust.
- c. NWC will be establishing a training academy and a research institute.
- d. Comments from the chat:
  - Syd Chan of Homes for All Newark: maybe environmental science STEM training and programs for elementary and secondary school kids? something to look into and something to do/provide to the community
  - ii. Amy Goldsmith of Clean Water Action: A lot of lead in soil is due to Current and legacy air deposition due to Newark being a transportation hub and industrial operations, as well as long time use of lead paint and scraped off the outside of buildings, highway bridges and rail get scrapped (lead in these types of paints are allowed still to this day) too. Lead levels are very very high in Camden under or near the bridges that head over to Phili.
    - Bavisha asked if airport/fuel from airplanes contributes to Newark's soil lead levels? Amy is unsure, but thinks this is possible.
    - Syd Chan noted that there likely are lead emissions from the trucks at Port Newark.

    - They have a goal to help facilitate more blood lead level testing for young children.
