1. Community Hubs - Updates and Support Requests

- a. Paterson Alliance (Shanikwa Lemon)
 - i. Shanikwa is seeking support with coordinating mobile blood lead level testing in Paterson.
 - 1. The group discussed the need for more point-of-care testing. Shanikwa is meeting with the Mayor of Paterson in March, and Elyse volunteered to support agenda planning for this meeting.
 - ii. Paterson Alliance is exploring a partnership with Dr. Robert Laumbach of Rutgers EOHSI.
- b. East Trenton Collaborative (Shereyl Snider)
 - i. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is addressing lead contamination at Ulysses S. Grant Intermediate School in the East Trenton neighborhood and has tested soil for lead at homes in the neighborhood. <u>Learn more</u>.
 - ii. Shereyl asked for support with increasing community involvement in this issue.
 - 1. Yvette recommended speaking with the mayor and reaching the community through faith based organizations.

- a. Overview of the governor's budget address (Sabrina Rodriguez-Vicenty, New Jersey Future)
 - i. NJ Budget in Brief from the Governor FY25: \$56 billion plan, 3% increase from this year, the increase is concerning due to declining state revenues and tax collections along with deadline to spend ARP funds. High-level notes include: first time state aid formula for education is fully funded, public employee pensions full contribution, funding for affordable housing, DEP will establish a Water Infrastructure Spending Dashboard, \$42 million new funding for clean and drinking water which does not meet the \$7 billion funding gap in the next 5 years.

- c. Plan LFNJ Advocacy Training Series in 2024
 - i.
